Best answer for this question, how do I size a keyframe in Cinema 4d?

1. STEP 1: SELECT THE OBJECT YOU WANT TO KEYFRAME IN THE OBJECT MANAGER.
2. STEP 2: GO TO THE FRAME IN THE TIMELINE RULER WHERE YOU WANT TO INSERT THE KEYFRAME.
3. STEP 3: PUSH THE SET KEY BUTTON IN THE ANIMATION PALETTE.
4. STEP 4: RINSE AND REPEAT.

To change grid size click on Edit and configure. Then click to the tab "Back". There you'll see the world grid, change number of the grid spacing.

The scale of shot, i.e. the apparent distance of the camera from the main subject of a scene, is one of the main stylistic and narrative functions of audiovisual products, conveying meaning and inducing the viewer's emotional state.

1. Click the Stopwatch icon next to the property name to activate it. After Effects creates a keyframe at the current time for that property value.
2. Choose Animation > Add [x] Keyframe, where [x] is the name of the property you are animating.

What is shot scale?

1.1. Shot scale. Shot scale measures the relative distance of the camera from the main filmed object, and as such, it is tied to the size of the human figures on the screen and the relative ratio of the foreground to the background [1].

What is the 30 degree rule in film?

A tenet in continuity film editing which states that the camera positions between two consecutive shots should be separated by at least 30 degrees with respect to the subject. In other words, combined with the 180 degree rule, the difference in camera angles between two shots should lie between 30 and 180 degrees.
